MEMORANDUM FOR All Combined/Joint Task Force (CJTF) – 82 Personnel

SUBJECT: CJTF – 82 GENERAL ORDER Number 1 – Punitive Prohibitions

1. REFERENCE:

CENTCOM General Order Number 1B, dated 13 March 06.

2. GENERAL: This General Order prescribes certain conduct for all personnel identified in Paragraph 3 below while present in the OEF or CJTF-82 AOR. This policy supplements any existing CENTCOM General Order, and accounts for the dissolution of CFC-A and assumption by CJTF-82 of CFC-A responsibility and authority. This order revokes the previous CJTF-76 General Order Number 1. This order will be further supplemented as needed by base, task force or subordinate commanders. United States and coalition force commanders are expected to enforce the provisions of this order.

3. APPLICABILITY: Except where specifically stated, this policy applies to:

a. All United States military personnel, United States civilians serving with, employed by, or accompanying the Armed Forces of the United States and coalition forces (military and civilians accompanying the military, including contingency contractor personnel (as defined in DoD Instruction 3020.41, dated 3 October 2005)) assigned or attached to CJTF-82 while serving in the CJTF-82 Combined/Joint Operational Area, and;

b. This order does not apply to North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) elements, the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF), Defense Attaché Offices, United States Marine Corps Security Detachments, sensitive intelligence and counter intelligence activities that are conducted under the direction and control of the Chief of Mission/Chief of Station, or other United States Government agencies and departments not under the control of CJTF-82.

4. PUNITIVE ORDER: Paragraph 5 of this order is punitive. United States personnel may face administrative action, nonjudicial punishment or judicial action under the Uniform Code of Military Justice for violations of this order. United States and coalition civilians serving with, employed by, or accompanying the force who violate this order may face criminal prosecution or

administrative action, to include termination of employment and redeployment. Coalition military forces who violate this order will be subject to administrative or disciplinary action in accordance with their national regulations.

5. PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES AND STANDARDS:

a. Weapons.

(1) Loaded Weapons. Unless directed otherwise by appropriate authority, required for a specific mission, or for reasons of self-defense, individuals will not chamber a round in their individual weapon. Weapons that use magazines will have a loaded magazine locked into the weapon, but no round chambered. Individuals assigned a belt fed weapon will keep the rounds in the bandolier or ammunition carrying case. All individuals will clear their assigned weapon before entering United States or coalition installations.

(2) Positive Personal Control. Personnel issued a weapon will maintain positive personal control of their weapon at all times. "Positive personal control" means the weapon is carried by the person, is under the control (guard) of a known individual, or is secured behind two doors (e.g. locked wall locker inside locked room). When outdoors, a person must carry their issued weapon exposed at all times, except when conducting physical training or for brief periods (i.e. latrine, smoke break, etc.) of time, and, depending on the force protection level, as prescribed by each installation or base commander.

b. Minefields. Damaging or removing minefield markings is prohibited. Knowingly entering an area that has not been cleared of mines is prohibited for all personnel except mine-clearing personnel in the performance of their duties.

c. Alcohol. Individuals are prohibited from the introduction, possession, sale, transfer, manufacture, or consumption of any alcoholic beverage. Non-United States coalition forces authorized by their command to consume alcohol will only do so within their discrete camp area, will not allow consumption to detract from mission accomplishment, and will not introduce, sell, or transfer alcohol to United States military or civilian personnel under any circumstances.

d. Drugs and Drug Paraphernalia. Individuals are prohibited from introducing, possessing, selling, transferring, manufacturing, or using any chemical, product, or substance with intention of obtaining an altered state of mind or an unnatural feeling of euphoria. Also prohibited are paraphernalia used to facilitate the manufacture or use of any such substance. This is intended to prohibit the intentional misuse of certain products (e.g. paint products, glue, nitrous oxide,

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prescribed or over-the-counter medicines, and other similar substances) for a purpose other than for which they were manufactured. It does not apply to the use of tobacco or caffeine products.

e. Living Spaces. Personnel are prohibited from entering the living space of the opposite sex, with the exception of personnel married to each other, unless for official military business. If entry is required for official military business, the door must remain open at all times.

f. Sex. Sexual relations in a deployed environment have a degrading affect on unit cohesion, morale, good order and discipline, and jeopardizes unit readiness as well as mission accomplishment. Therefore, sexual relations and intimate behavior between individuals not married to each other are prohibited.

g. Muslim Dead. Muslim dead, including enemy dead, will be treated with respect and to the greatest extent possible, without compromising ongoing military operations, will be interred in accordance with Muslim religious practice and tradition. The guidance contained in CENTCOM Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) for Muslim Burial Practices, dated 4 June 2004, will be followed. Muslim dead will not be burned or cremated under any circumstance. Every effort will be made to bury Muslim remains within the first 24 hours following death. The maximum time for burial should be 72 hours. The burial will be carried out in accordance with Muslim customs and local religious leaders will, if possible, be consulted to ensure the proper actions are taken.

h. Respect for Afghan Culture and Religion. Words, gestures and acts that are disrespectful to Afghans, their cultural practices, or their religious beliefs are likely to have a significant negative impact on the mission and endanger the safety of United States and Coalition forces in Afghanistan. Any word, gesture or act directed at, conveyed to, or made in the presence of any Afghan citizen by United States or Coalition Forces, DoD civilians, or DoD contract personnel with the intent to insult, disrespect or degrade Afghan citizens, their culture, or their religious beliefs is prohibited.

i. Vehicle Operations.

(1) Seat belts. When available, seat belts will be worn when traveling in all vehicles.

(2) A ground guide will be used for backing all tactical vehicles.

(3) Open air vehicles and heavy equipment. All personnel will wear an advanced combat helmet, a ballistic helmet, an approved safety helmet, or a hard hat, and protective eyewear when driving or riding in any open-air vehicle (such as a Gator or 4-wheeler). Personnel operating

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heavy equipment (such as a forklift or other construction equipment) will wear the advanced combat helmet, the ballistic helmet, or an approved safety helmet.

j. Smoking in tents or buildings is prohibited.

k. United States and Other Property.

(1) United States personnel are prohibited from giving host nation civilians any property belonging to the United States Government (such as ACUs, DCUs, Meals Ready to Eat (MREs), beverages, scrap wood, or other supplies) unless authorized by the Base Commander.

(2) United States personnel are prohibited from giving host nation civilians any personal property that is identical to or bears a strong resemblance to property belonging to the United States Government (such as privately owned ACUs or DCUs, or other uniform items) unless authorized by the Base Commander.

l. Proxy Web Servers. Proxy web servers are a computer network internet service which allow clients to make indirect network connections to other network services. Users mask their surfing habits by going to a web proxy server to surf from that location, thereby circumventing the measures put in place to enforce DoD and CENTCOM policy. Unauthorized proxy web servers are those proxy web servers that are not located on the DoD network. Therefore, using unauthorized proxy web servers to access web sites is prohibited.

6. INDIVIDUAL DUTY: Due to the unique challenges inherent to providing military and civilian support to a Muslim nation, it is essential that all personnel remain focused at all times on the culture and mores of the sovereign nation in which we operate. We must work in close cooperation with our Coalition Partners and Afghan National Security Forces. Accordingly, all persons, military and civilian, subject to this General Order, are charged with the individual duty to become familiar with, and respect the laws, regulations and customs of Afghanistan insofar as they do not interfere with the execution of their official duties. Acts of disrespect or violations of Afghan law, regulation or customs may be punished under applicable criminal statutes and administrative regulation.

7. DRIVING REGULATIONS: Safe driving practices save soldiers' lives and enhance our relations with the people of Afghanistan. Commanders at all levels will publish and implement appropriate directives that will direct safe driving practices, and will at a minimum set maximum speed limits, minimum safe following distances, prohibit unsafe lane changes and prohibit aggressive driving while operating both tactical and non-tactical vehicles. Weapons will not be

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pointed at civilians unless required for force protection. Unless otherwise dictated by tactical circumstances, drivers will serve as models for Afghan citizens. Their performance will reflect total respect for the Afghan citizenry and their laws.

8. INSTALLATION POLICIES: Installation commanders are directed to publish and implement Installation /AO specific policies regarding the following topics;

a. Force Protection (FP) Measures. At a minimum such measures will include rules related to base defense drills, positive personal weapon control, loading and chambering ammunition, clearing procedures/requirements, speed limits and vehicle operation standards, other appropriate traffic regulations, installation access and vehicle search procedures, individual access badge/escort requirements and compound curfew.

b. Individual Movement Policies. At a minimum, such policies will include rules related to the two person rule, body armor requirements and restricted areas on and IVO each installation.

c. Uniform Wear and Appearance. At a minimum such policies will address duty and PT uniform wear as well as authorized wear of civilian clothing. Policies will include requirements for United States, Coalition, and civilian personnel.

d. Installation Management. Policies should cover installation appropriate rules concerning smoking, fires, real estate use, tent use and modification and water and electricity use.

e. Personnel Policies. At a minimum such policies will address in and out processing requirements, awards and leave and passes. Installation commanders will ensure that all such policies are consistent with those established by CJTF-82.


9. UNIT COMMANDER RESPONSIBILITY: Commanders, Security Assistance Office Chiefs and military and civilian supervisors are charged with ensuring that all personnel are briefed on the prohibitions and requirements of this General Order. Commanders and supervisors are expected to exercise discretion and good judgment in enforcing this General Order. Subordinate commanders are free to further restrict their forces as they deem necessary provided that any further restriction related to the content of this General Order is provided to the CJTF-82 Office of the Staff Judge Advocate.

10. EFFECTIVE DATE/EXPIRATION: This General Order is effective immediately and will expire only when rescinded by the Commander, CJTF-82 or higher authority. Military customs and other pre-clearance officials will enforce this General Order in their inspections of personnel and equipment prior to departure from the AOR.
