THE PROGRAM

October 30 - November 4, 2011

This first iteration of this five-day Executive Global Leadership Course focuses specifically on teaching high performing executives how to lead complex, networked organizations in a fast-paced and challenging environment. Built on a foundation of operational experience gained in the post 9/11 world, the course features the CrossLead process developed by General (Ret) McChrystal and his team (mostly former Special Operators) and is presented through seminars, team interactions, open forum discussions, and uniquely challenging simulations. These simulations reinforce the principles learned in the classroom as executive teams respond to a rapidly evolving global crisis scenario.

The course sessions are broken into five primary blocks:

- **Seminars,** led by uniquely experienced operators, present the building blocks of GEN (Ret) McChrystal's CrossLead principles a leadership system that involves communication processes, knowledge and time management systems, and technological innovations.
- Daily Coordination (Operation & Intelligence) Briefings demonstrate the forum that was effectively employed by the Joint Special Operations Task Force to "lead from the center" while decentralizing decision making and operations.
- Class Practicals on the previous day's lesson allow for planning, brainstorming, and information sharing; skills will be relevant to both your organization and the coursework.
- **Executive Time with Mentors** will be used to review the day, conduct internal "After Action Reviews," and prepare for the following day.
- **Simulations** are dynamic exercises built on a global crisis scenario in which executives will be challenged to gather and disperse information across a network to develop effective shared situational awareness.

During the week, GEN (Ret) McChrystal and his staff will lead and monitor all the exercises and provide perspective and lessons learned. On the final day of the course, an open forum will be held for review of the week's lessons.



General McChrystal (USA/Ret) is a Senior Fellow at the Jackson Institute for Global Affairs and was Commander of the International Security Assistance Force and Commander of United States Forces Afghanistan. His career in the U.S. Army spanned 34 years. Prior to his service in Afghanistan, he served as Director of the Joint Staff (2008-2009), where he assisted the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in managing the direction, operation, and integration of all combat land, naval, and air forces. Previously, he commanded the Joint Special Operations Command (2003-2008). In this capacity, for almost five years, he directed elite U.S. military forces in Iraq, Afghanistan, and elsewhere around the world. General Stanley A. McChrystal is noted for the transformational approach he and his team implemented and he was called "one of America's greatest warriors" by Secretary of Defense Robert Gates. He is currently teaching leadership at Yale and serves on the White House Joining Forces initiative, aimed at improving the lives of military families.
